**MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$142,558** 

**INFANT:** Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$13,972

Center-based: \$20,585

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$13,527

Center-based: \$16,577

This is 9%-12% of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: \$15,348
