What child care options are available to families?

-  **195** Child care centers can serve up to **17,678** children
-  **417** Licensed child care homes can serve up to **4,506** children
-  **349** License-exempt home caregivers can serve around **770** children

How much are families paying for child care?

MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: **\$126,743**

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$11,710**
-  Center-based: **\$21,214**

This is **9%-17%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$10,193**
-  Center-based: **\$15,940**

This is **8%-13%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$15,348**
